## 287 CASES OF SCARLET FEVER REPORTED IN WEEK

Epidemic is Mild, However—No Deaths Reported During Week and Few During Year.

An increase in the number of cases of scarlet fever during the past week was noted in the report of health conditions for the week ended yesterday, submitted to Dr. John D. Blake, the Commissioner of Health. The report showed that 287 cases of the malady were reported. There were no deaths, however. Baltimore is passing through an epidemic of this disease. It is mild, however, as there have been very few deaths. The health authorities are particularly anxious, however, that all patients be isolated because of the contagious nature of scarlet fever.

There was a total of 230 deaths during the week, which was 53 less than the total for the corresponding week of last year. The principal causes of deaths were measles, 1; diphtheria, 2; influenza, 3; tuberculosis, 2; cancer, 18; apoplexy, 16; heart disease, 29; bronchitis, 2; broncho-pneumonia, 13; lobar-pneumonia, 15; diseases of early infancy,

17, and Bright's disease, 17. Ten persons died as the result of accidents; two went into the Great Beyond by the suicide route and two were murdered. The death rate for the week was 17.85 per 1,000 of the population. New cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week as follows: Typhoid fever, 3; measles, 39; diphtheria, 22; scarlet fever, 287; influenza, 14; tuberculosis, 19; small-pox, 1; mumps, 91; chickenpox, 41; broncho-pneumonia, 15, and lobar-pneumonia, 12. There were 337 births during the week.
