Gives Up Proposed Visit to Halifax

Notwithstanding the assurances of Lieutenant-Governor Coolidge, Henry B. Endicott, executive chairman of the Public Safety Committee, and his private secretary, Henry F. Long, to the effect that his presence in Massachusetts was not immediately needed, Governor McCall decided to abandon his contemplated trip to Halifax, N. S. Accordingly he returned to his home in Winchester yesterday and will remain in close touch with the influenza situation until the epidemic is checked. The Governor was to have been the guest of the city of Halifax and Dalhousie University for several days as a mark of appreciation of the prompt aid given by him and by the State of Massachusetts after the munitions ship explosion and conflagration at Halifax last December, and was to have lectured at the university.

FIND BULLET HOLES IN HEAD

Death of Bangor Salesman to Be Investigated

BANGOR, Me., Sept. 28.—The authorities tonight were investigating the death of Arno Burr Cayting of this city, whose body was found yesterday in the woods near a road in the town of Greenbush. There were four bullet wounds in the head and the forehead was crushed. A motor car was standing in the road nearby.

Cayting, who was 34 years old, was employed as a travelling salesman for the American Tobacco Company. He left home last Monday for a trip in the northern part of the State. The Otis Town police were informed by a wood-chopper yesterday that an automobile had been beside the road in Greenbush for several days, and a search resulted in the finding of the body. In one pocket was a billfold containing \$15.

DECREASE IN GRIP SCOURGE

Is Only Slight and Situation Remains Serious—Appeal for Women to Aid Nurses

There was a decrease of three deaths due to the epidemic yesterday in Boston, according to the reports of the Board of Health. There were 119 deaths attributed to Spanish influenza and 30 deaths to pneumonia. The reports of the previous day showed 128 influenza deaths and 24 pneumonia. The urgent need for doctors and nurses is the paramount feature of the epidemic. There is but little change in the situation, according to State Health Commissioner Eugene R. Kelley, who declared last night that the situation continues serious. Throughout the State the fight against the disease

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BULGARIAN BASE OF KRUSHEVO CAPTURED

ROME, Sept. 28.—Krushevo, an important Bulgarian base, 20 miles north of Monastir, has been captured by Italian troops, who also have driven the enemy from the mountain ranges between the Cerna and Vellika rivers. The official statement from the Italian war office says that the Italians also are pursuing the Bulgarians on the Monastir-Kichevo road north of Demirhissar, an advance of 20 miles.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 28.—Nothing was known officially in Berlin late Saturday night of the reported resignation of Chancellor von Hertling, according to a despatch received here from the German capital.

Allies Capture 40,000 Prisoners in Three Days

PARIS, Sept. 29.—French, British, American and Belgian troops in the last three days have captured 40,000 prisoners and 300 guns, it is estimated here.

Since July 18 the allies have captured 200,000 prisoners, 3000 guns, 20,000 machine guns and enormous quantities of material. This does not take in account the operations in Macedonia and Palestine.
