

# PREVENTIVE OF PNEUMONIA IS PREPARED HERE

Vaccine Will Be Delivered to Doctors Free, but is Not Intended as a Cure for Malady.

A vaccine intended for the prevention of pneumonia is being prepared by a large number of doctors and scientists under the direction of City Health Commissioner Manning. These doctors are from the faculties of the University of Nebraska College of Medicine and Creighton Medical college and they are engaged in studying the "flu," its causes, methods of propagation and treatment.

"The vaccine will be ready probably the first of next week," said Dr. Manning. "It will be given free to all doctors in the city and state who apply for it. It is not intended as a cure but as a preventative. It is harmless and no bad effects are felt from its use."

### Cases Diminish.

The germs used in making the vaccine are taken from victims of the disease here. They are placed in a culture where they grow and multiply. Then they are placed in a salt solution where they die and form the vaccine.

The report of new cases of "flu" in Omaha showed that the daily number is still less than it was Thursday. Only 80 new cases were reported to the health commissioner in the 24 hours ending at 9 o'clock Friday morning. During the same period 26 deaths were reported. A number of these, however, occurred several days ago and had not been reported.

More than 100 medical students are volunteers on call at the Visiting Nurses' association and the Red Cross. They go out to attend cases of "flu" which are not very serious but which require the attendance of a doctor. There are also a number of doctors who have medical students helping them in their regular work.

Dr. Manning again warned pool proprietors today that they should limit crowds in their places. A number of towns the pool halls have been closed. Those in Omaha are said to be badly ventilated, unclean and crowded during many hours of the day.

### Nine Pass Exams for Red Cross Ambulance Corps

Nine have passed the physical examination and have received approval of their local board to enter the Red Cross ambulance corps for immediate duty overseas.

They will undergo training in Omaha after which they will be assigned to their proper contingent.
