Atlanta Is Included In Underground System For the Sale of Narcotics

Chattanooga, Tenn., October 30.—After the arrest here today of H. Walter Doty, an attorney, and Dr. Henry Fuehrer, federal agents announced that with the aid of the military and municipal police they had unearthed an underground narcotic sales system extending to many cities of the south, including Atlanta and Birmingham.

Eleven persons who visited the joint offices of the lawyer and doctor were arrested and the officials said that on examination some of them admitted that they made regular trips to southern cities to dispose of narcotic supplied to them by Doty and Fuehrer.

Doty formerly was assistant attorney general of Ohio, while Fuehrer has been living here for several years. The physician is now under indictment for violation of the Harrison anti-narcotic act.

MAYOR ASA CANDLER TO QUIT PUBLIC LIFE

The plans of Mayor Candler are to retire to private life after the expiration of his term as mayor on January 1. He has already turned his business interests to his sons, so that he will be free from the many demands formerly made upon him. Before assuming office he resigned his active connections with the Coca-Cola company and the Georgia Railway and Power company, as well as with other businesses in which he has been a leading figure.

Taking his father's place, Charles Howard Candler, the eldest son, became president of the Coca-Cola company, of which William Candler is cashier; Asa G. Candler, Jr., has taken charge of the Candler realty properties and is general manager for Asa G.
