AMERICANS AT BAY ON CAMBRAI FRONT

Anzacs Trying to Rescue Small Band Far Ahead

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON
THE ST QUENTIN FRONT, Oct 1 (By
A. P.)—Some hundreds of Americans in
a certain far advanced position between
Cambrai and St Quentin, which they
reached late Sunday, were holding out
valiantly against superior enemy num-
bers, according to latest reports which
were received yesterday.

The Australians made heroic attempts
to assist them, and so far as can be
learned, are still keeping up these ef-
forts, the result of which is not known.
Furious fighting continues here.

Day's Deaths in Boston Total 206— Pennsylvania Sends Aid

Boston's death roll between 10 p m
Monday and 10 p m Tuesday 206,
highest to date. Largest previous
number, 171.

City Health Commissioner Wood-
ward reports big decrease in new hospi-
tal cases in Boston.

State Health Commissioner Kelley
reports to Federal Public Health
Service Chief that conditions are im-
proving in Boston, epidemic over at
Camp Devens, no deaths among Mer-
chant Marine or in Northeastern De-
partment and fewer cases in 1st
Naval District.

Massachusetts.

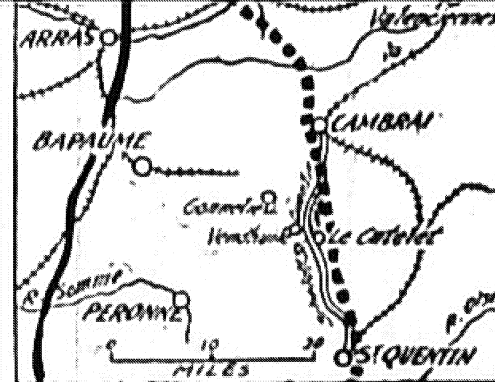
Influenza cases must be reported to

ALLENBY'S CAVALRY SURROUND DAMASCUS

1000 Prisoners Taken in Long Ride to the North

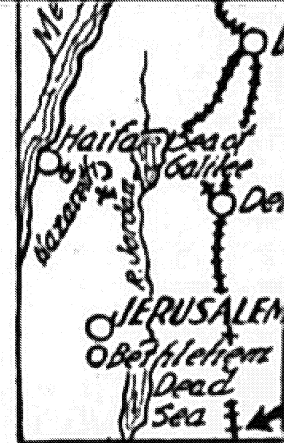
LONDON, Oct 1—British forces
marching north from Palestine have
virtually surrounded Damascus. They
are established north, west and south
of the city, it is officially announced
today.

The troops which have effected this
movement are cavalry forces. Some
1000 prisoners and five guns were taken
from the enemy rear guards.

The text of the statement reads:
"By the evening of Sept 30 our cavalry
had established themselves on the
north, west and south of Damascus.
From the enemy rear guards which
disputed the advance throughout the
day 1000 prisoners and five guns were
taken."
