# GET REPORT OF NINETEEN FRESH CASES

## All Billiard Parlors and Bowling Alleys in City Ordered Closed.

### BAN ON ALL RESORTS.

Every pool hall and bowling alley in the city was closed this afternoon by order of Dr. J. B. Anderson, city health officer.

The closing order came after Dr. Anderson and deputies from the health office had made a round of the places and found many violating the Spanish influenza quarantine by allowing people to congregate.

The proprietors will be permitted to sell tobacco and confectionery only after they have walled off these counters from the rest of the room.

Up to 12 o'clock today 19 new cases of Spanish influenza had been reported to the health office, all of which, according to Dr. J. B. Anderson, health officer, were of a very mild form. These are in addition to 19 new cases reported yesterday.

Speaking of entering homes where there are people with bad colds or influenza, Dr. Anderson said:

**"It is absolutely forbidden that people enter in or visit at homes where the occupants have even a bad cold, because, before the case is diagnosed, it is hard to tell whether it is influenza or not."**

"I do not indorse the plan of putting up cards of quarantine, because I believe every citizen of Spokane will act according to instructions. We are all on our honor. If that can't be trusted, of course other measures will have to be introduced. All we ask is cooperation. This alone will have a great tendency toward keeping down an epidemic."

### Total of Cases, 256.

A total of 256 cases have been reported to the health office since the epidemic first struck the city. This number includes the 19 new cases reported this morning.

Two deaths have been reported since the epidemic started, and those were fully developed cases of pneumonia. Judging from the reports that are coming in to the health office, the cases are well scattered throughout the city, and it is believed by the health officials that there are no congested districts where the disease is centering.

"If people will just use good, common horse sense, there is no need to fear a panic or to have any ground concern," stated Dr. Anderson.

# NEARLY MILLION AND A HALF YET TO BE PLEDGED

## Spokane Must Move Fast in Next Few Days to Raise Its Quota.

Spokane's total purchases of fourth Liberty bonds reached \$4,125,000 today. There remains \$1,416,712 to be secured to reach the city's quota of \$5,641,712.

Outside of Spokane and the eight counties of the Spokane district have subscribed for \$2,045,000, according to reports to the Chronicle today. This leaves only \$145,000 to come to reach the quota of \$2,190,000 outside of Spokane county. The counties which have not yet reached their quota will certainly do so, it is said, but this, with over-subscriptions in other counties, will raise the total well over the quota.

Official reports to San Francisco show 100 per cent of the 12th district quota in the banks. All the other divisions of the district are well over the 50 per cent mark, with the exception of northern and southern California and Nevada.

### Must "Speed Up."

Eliminating the five principal cities the percentage of the subscribers averaged 75 to 80 per cent of the number needed, and "speed up" orders were issued today to Pacific coast points said to be lagging.

Preparations for a large Liberty loan were announced in San Francisco today when advices were received that part of the war material on the Liberty loan special train, now touring the southern part of the district, would be sent to that city for use in the fifth and subsequent loans an advertising matter.

Spokane banks will be open from 10 a. m. until 8 p. m. tomorrow, and every evening next week from 6 until 8 o'clock, the clearing house un-

# HOOKER FAILS TO COME INTO COURT; BONDS FORFEITED

J. E. ("Stub") Hooker failed to appear before Justice Stocker this morning to answer to the charge of having liquor in his possession on October 1.

The second charge followed as a result of further evidence which tended to show that Hooker had removed about four sacks of whiskey from the cache where he, with James A. Donovan, motorcycle policeman, and J. T. ("Fat") Whalen, had deposited it after taking it from J. L. Smith, confessed bootlegger.

Hooker has not yet paid the fine of \$75 and costs which was fixed by Justice Stocker when he entered a plea of guilty of having liquor in his possession on September 28.
