

AVOID WORRY, 'FLU' WARNING

U. of M. Health Expert Says Fatalistic Viewpoint Holds in Epidemic.

ANN ARBOR, Oct. 16.—"Wash your hands clean, avoid crowds and don't worry. The Spanish influenza germ won't get you anyway unless it has your name written on it. Most people are relatively immune from it. The epidemic is attacking those who are not immune, those who are susceptible; it is burning the dry grass."

That is the opinion of Dr. Christopher G. Farnall, superintendent of the University of Michigan Hospital and one of the country's most prominent authorities on public health.

"Further, city people are less susceptible to germ attacks than those of the country and are less apt to succumb to pneumonia; and that should be some consolation to Detroiters," Dr. Farnall said. "This is borne out by statistics from the big communities. The men from cities have greater resistance to germs spread by crowds, probably because they are more exposed to crowds."

SEES FOLLY IN WORRY.

"I can not emphasize too strongly the folly of worry and hysteria in epidemics like the present. Those who are relatively immune will not be attacked, in all human probability, and the majority of people seem to be immune. Right here in Ann Arbor, in the barracks, we see some men succumb to the influenza, but the majority escape, although living under the same conditions and subject to the same infection. Soldiers have a saying that if their name is not written on a shell they will not be struck. The same fatalistic viewpoint is true as regards influenza germs."

"Another thing that should be emphasized is the need of keeping the hands clean and away from the face. People will persist in putting their hands to their faces, even to their mouths, and that habit is apt to carry germs into the system."

"I believe that if everybody wore gauze masks in crowds or when in close contact with anybody, why coughs, that the number of cases might be reduced. The layman is apt to be skeptical concerning the efficacy of masks, saying that if germs are as small as they are represented, they surely could crawl through holes in the gauze."

"FLU" GERMS DON'T CRAWL.

"That would be true if germs could crawl, but germs, Spanish influenza germs, are not animals, able to crawl. They are vegetable and unable to crawl. The masks break up the sprays of germs from the mouth and nose. The sprays are cast against the masks and stay there. They probably are more effective in preventing the escape of germs from an infected person than in keeping the germs, once released, from an uninfected person."

"We can not control the Spanish influenza epidemic, but we can reduce the number of cases by precautionary measures, and thus reduce the virulence of the germs. The epidemic will run its course."

"Don't worry, avoid crowds, keep the hands clean."

WELSH RAREBITS GO; "HAM AND" LIVE ON

Even Club Sandwiches Are Banned by U. S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Regulation club sandwiches containing chicken and bacon, or any dishes combining more than one kind of meat, must disappear from hotel menus, according to an interpretation by the Federal Food Board of the 12 regulations governing public eating houses, recently announced by the hotel division of the Food Administration.

Welsh rarebits are also banned, but the established combinations of ham and eggs or bacon and eggs are not to be disturbed. Patrons may call for reduced portions, it is ruled, with the provision that "it should be understood when such a reduced portion is served, the price should be reduced accordingly."

It is explained that the general orders do away with the service of bread and tomato as a garniture under meat, but do not forbid placing poached eggs or chipped beef on toast. This, it is stated, is designed to stop the "wasteful practice of serving bread and toast simply to make a dish look attractive."
