CITY SCHOOLS TO HOLD FULL SESSION TODAY

WILL MAKE UP FOR HOLIDAY
GRANTED FOR VICTORY CELE-
BRATION.

All city schools will hold session at the regular hours today in order to make up for the holiday granted in celebration of victory. This action of J. F. Kimball, superintendent of city schools, was officially sanctioned by the School Board at its regular meeting yesterday afternoon. Instructions were given the teachers and principals to be in their places this morning at the usual hour. At Bryan High School pupils will be expected to be on hand ten minutes earlier to hear the lecture to be delivered by Private Ernest Lovell, a returned soldier from the Canadian Army.

In addition to passing officially upon the matter of holding school today, the board also acted upon a number of routine affairs. Vacancies in the grade schools were filled by the election of Miss Lillah Rogers, Miss Robbie Lancaster, Miss Vounie Peters and Miss Rochelle Silberman. Miss Jessie Thatcher and C. T. McCormick were elected to fill vacancies in the high schools. A leave of absence was granted to A. B. Sage, head of the Bryan High School manual training department. Mr. Sage will engage in Government rehabilitation work. The resignation of Miss Leona Tucker, Norma Clark and Katherine Gray were accepted by the board. Miss Gray will enter the State Department of Education at Austin.

It was decided by the board that a night school should be established at Douglas School in addition to those already maintained, as petitions for instruction there have been numerous. A gridiron at Forest High School will be constructed under the direction of the business agent of the board. The library at Fannin School is to be supplied with tables so that students using the books will be able to write in the library. An appropriation to equal the fund collected by the Houston School Mothers' Club, but not exceeding \$200, was voted for the erection of playground apparatus at that school.

Other minor expenses were referred to the business agent for closer attention. An appropriation of \$50 was made to improve the library of Fannin School. It was decided to postpone the improvement of Forest High School grounds until after school dismissals in June.

RABBI BOSNIAK TO HOLD VICTORY SERVICE TODAY.

"Victory services" will be held this morning at Temple Shaaneth Israel. Rabbi Jacob Bosniak will speak on "How the Mighty Hath Fallen." Prayers of thanksgiving for the victory of the allies will be offered. Rabbi Bosniak said that notice has been received that William N. Kleinman of the 365th Infantry has been missing in action since Sept. 26. No memorial service will be held pending further information from Washington, but prayers for his safety will be offered.

Request was recently received from the State Council of Defense that the erection of the new synagogue at Eakins street and Park avenue be postponed until after the war. Dr. Bosniak said, however, that in the light of the ruling made in Washington Wednesday removing restrictions on building materials on churches to the extent of \$25,000, the congregation has it under advisement to proceed immediately on the erection of the first floor of the synagogue, which will not exceed that amount. The first floor will suffice for religious purposes.
