LONDON, Sept. 26.—Railway traffic in south Wales and elsewhere was resumed this morning. Practically all strikers returned to work.

RICHMOND NOW READY FOR BIG LOAN CAMPAIGN

RICHMOND, Sept. 26.—At a meeting of Liberty loan workers, which crowded the Elks' club room to its capacity, final plans were laid last night for the work of the campaign which begins next Saturday. Charles J. Cray, chairman of the executive committee, presided at the meeting and explained the details of the system by which Richmond is to raise its quota of \$465,000.

F. S. Nelson, president of the San Francisco Ad club, spoke to the workers on the importance of the present loan and urged all to do their share. Following Nelson's speech the meeting divided into the mobilized women, industrial heads and business men, each of which held a separate conference. The campaign will be ushered in with an industrial parade on Friday night, in which 5000 men are expected to be marching.

ROME, Sept. 26.—Professor Ciauri, director of the military hospital at Cotrone, announced today that he had discovered and isolated the bacillus of Spanish influenza. The disease, which was brought in by repatriated prisoners, is raging throughout the country.

8 INFLUENZA CASES IN S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26.—Eight authentic cases of Spanish influenza had been reported to the city board of health here at noon today. Three were reported today.

SIX CASES SOUTH LOS ANGELES, Sept. 20.—Spanish influenza struck Los Angeles today, according to the local health officers, who said six cases had been reported to them. They have not yet had an opportunity to verify the reports.

U. S. MANDATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Instructions have been sent to California draft boards to proceed with the examination of registrants to determine their physical fitness for military service, the war department announced today. This is to be done regardless of any appeal that may have been made to the district board unless there is a claim pending for deferred classification.

In connection with this, it was also announced that a registrant who has been examined by the local board and found fit for service will not have the right to appeal for examination before the medical advisory board as has been the practice in previous drafts. Those previously found qualified will be inducted into the military service in accordance with their order number, as determined by the drawing to be held, soon, except in individual cases, where orders have been received by local boards for the voluntary induction of certain registrants into the army, navy or marine corps.

GILLARD LOSES IN COURT FIGHT

With only four out of thirty-six precincts unavassated at noon today, the contest of Jas. H. Gillard against Edgar S. Hurley before Judge Everett J. Brown, for the republican nomination for assemblyman from the thirty-eighth district, showed practically no change, and Gillard frankly admitted his defeat. About thirty votes were changed, but the gains were offset by the losses in almost every instance. The original returns showed Gillard 131 votes behind Hurley. In one precinct neither of these candidates had received any votes, all having been totalled with those for the socialist candidate. Gillard gained twenty-nine and Hurley twenty-six by the correction.
