CONTRACTS APPROVED FOR WORK AT FORT

Construction contracts for \$130,000 worth of new buildings at Fort Douglas for the general hospital, have been received, approved from Washington, and turned over to the Lynch-Cannon Engineering company of this city. The contracts call for a hall and kitchen, with two sets of barracks for the hospital corps, work to begin as soon as the material has been received. The new buildings will be connected with the hospital units by covered passage ways. They will be of wooden structure. There is considerable other work to be done, including installation of a heating plant, school house, work shop, and alterations on the main hospital. Then, a home is to be built for convalescent soldiers, also a nurses dormitory, under the direction of the Red Cross, to cost respectively \$100,000 and \$33,000, and presented to the government.

Another Death at Post.

Thomas W. Ostler, 21 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Ostler of Nephi, died in the post hospital at Fort Douglas Sunday of influenza-pneumonia. The body was taken to Nephi today for funeral services and interment. Mr. Ostler was a member of A. Company, S. A. T. C., at the University of Utah. He is survived by a widow and small child, his parents and several brothers and sisters. One of his brothers, Corp. Frank R. Ostler, Company I, 342nd Infantry, Ninety-first division, A. E. F., was killed in action Oct. 5.

Will Continue Work.

It is probable the war community service will be continued for another year, according to Ray R. Rugg, executive secretary of the local branch of the service. The local branch will assist the city commission in every way possible in securing positions for returned soldiers and will maintain at the Commercial club a registration bureau, where all honorably discharged soldiers may register for employment.
