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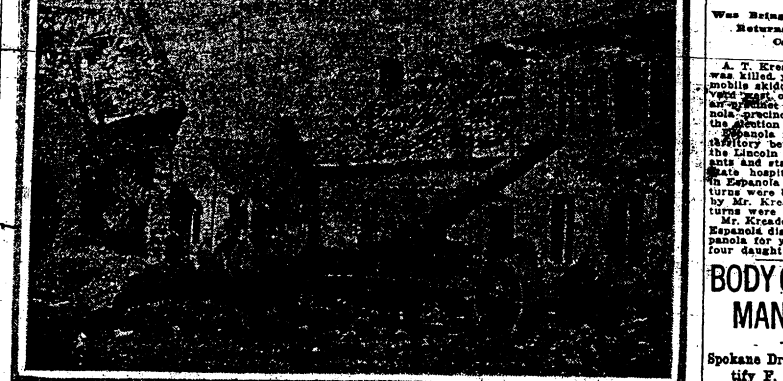
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Heavy-Brench Guns Drives Hun From Cambrai

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ALL SPOKANE TO WEAR FLU MASKS

State Requires Use of Device in Stores, Cars, Corridors, Public Places, in Offices.

Soft Drink Pastors, Soda Fountains Must Sell Glasses After Each Use.

New regulations requiring the wearing of influenza masks in public places adopted last Monday by the state board of health.

The regulations are statewide and their enforcement is said to rest with the health officers of the state and the police departments of cities. The regulations become effective at the close of their adoption as emergency measures.

Dr. John E. Anderson, city health officer, stated that he would instruct his inspectors to see that the order is enforced. The action of the state board of health reenacts the closing orders adopted by the city health officer on October 2, which includes schools, churches, theaters, picture shows and places where people congregate, also pool rooms, card rooms and similar places and in addition to the following places:

Restaurants, soda fountains, ice cream parlors and soft drink places, where glasses and utensils are not boiled after each use, or individual containers used shall be disinfected. This latter regulation is broader than that previously required by the city health officer.

According to the state order influenza masks are to be made of gauze of a fineness not less than 70-75 mesh, and inclosed in a paper or other material and entirely covering the mouth and nose. The masks are to be worn in the following places:
