She has received letters from him stating that he is in a base hospital near Paris recovering from an injury to his arm. He is a member of a machinegun battalion.

Sergeant Amadeo Tomassetti, who reported in yesterday's paper as wounded, belongs to Company K, Thirty-ninth Infantry. He lived at No. 27 Frank street before joining the colors last spring. He was employed at the Kelly Shoe Company. His wife lives in Plymouth avenue north.

Henry Dittman, of No. 156 Herald street, has been killed in action, according to word received by relatives.

Edward Bowman, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Bowman, of No. 45 Hennekey park, is named in the casualty list this morning as killed in action. Word of his having been killed was received by his parents a few days ago. He was killed on September 17th while straggling the Boches with the 810th Infantry.

Charles B. Jones is named on the Canadian casualty list as wounded. His wife and two children live at No. 2281 Bidwell terrace. He enlisted at the Rochester station of the Canadian and British Re-ruiting Mission on January 2d last. Mrs. Bidwell last Monday received official notification of his having been wounded. He was a member of the Second Company, Twelfth Reserves. Mr. Bidwell came to Rochester from

Harold E. Hoefel, of the Marines, was severely wounded in action on September 12th, according to word received yesterday from the War Department by his mother, Mrs. Sabina Hoefel, of No. 6 Carl street. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in April, 1917 shortly after the United States entered the war, and was sent to Brooklyn, and from there was transferred to Iona Island. He stayed there eight months before being sent back to Brooklyn. He applied for an overseas transfer and received a month's training at Quantico, Va., and sailed for France two months ago.

He has a brother, Herbert Hoefel, now at the front with the 408th Infantry, who has been in France since last June.

A. J. Flehler, who died on Tuesday at the Naval Hospital, Newport, R. I., was a member of the Naval Radio, Eighth Company, Fourth Regiment, and was stationed at Newport, R. I. He was graduated from Holy Family School and from St. Joseph's High.

Cadet Corps Drills Suspended; Meetings and Other Activities Canceled Because of Influenza

Because of the prevalence of Spanish influenza the Military Training Commission has suspended all drills of the Cadet Corps until October 21st. This order affects not only Rochester, but the whole Western Central Zone, which takes in the territory from Lake Ontario to the Pennsylvania line and from Brockport to and including Auburn.

No meetings will be held in Odd Fellows' Temple, No. 11-Clinton avenue north, until October 21st and only officers will be permitted to transact necessary business there. This is ordered by Charles Schneider, president of the association that owns the building.

The Jewish Young Men's Association decided last night to close its building until October 21st, and longer if advisable.

The state convention of the W. C. T. U. that was to open in Binghamton today is postponed indefinitely.

The council of the Episcopal Diocese of Western New York has postponed without date the session called for October 15th in this city for the election of a bishop coadjutor.

The South Avenue Baptist Church will be closed next Sunday and all meetings called for this week and next week, with the exception of Red Cross meetings, are canceled.

The Monroe County Tuberculosis Dispensary will be closed today and until further notice.

The conference of village and rural teachers that was to be held in Kodak School to-morrow, is postponed. This action was taken by the district superintendents of schools after consulting with the health officers of the towns.
