GOVERNOR MOVES TO STOP CIRCUS

Fears It Will Spread "Flu"
and Demoralize La-
bor

ASKS HEALTH BOARD TO ISSUE AN ORDER

To Prevent Ringling's Show
From Touring the
State

Columbia, Sept. 21.—As a precaution against the spread of Spanish influenza, a few cases of which have been reported at Camp Jackson and in a number of States of the Union, Gov. Manning has called on the State board of health to issue an order preventing Ringling Bros. circus from touring the State.

Dr. J. A. Hayne has taken the matter up with the other members of the board and is expected to issue a statement shortly.

Governor Manning stated today that he felt that there was real danger of the circus spreading the disease over the State. Besides he feels that it will be a great demoralization of labor at this time when it is essential that everybody should be at work. There is cotton in the fields that must be picked and there is other work that must be done.

It would be hard to estimate the loss that would result to the State, the Governor thinks, from the attendance of farm labor on the circus and the consequent loss of a day's work.

U. S. HAS EMBARKED 1,750,000 TROOPS

Gen. March Reports Great
Total of Americans
Sent Overseas

PERSHING'S FRONT NOW STABILIZED

Americans Are Ten Miles
From Metz and From
Conflans

Washington, Sept. 21.—Embarkation of American soldiers for all fronts overseas has now passed the 1,750,000 mark, General March announced today. He said military news during the past week from all fronts has been continuously good.

On the Lorraine front where General Pershing's first American army has completed its operation to eliminate the St. Mihiel salient, the situation has become stabilized, with the enemy hurriedly perfecting a new line in front of the Americans. This line stretched for twenty miles from Maizeray to the Moselle at Vandieres. The Americans now are ten miles from Metz and an equal distance from Conflans.

Answering questions regarding specific American units, General March said the 90th division (Texas and Oklahoma national army troops) is in the Vosges, while the 36th (Texas and Oklahoma national guard troops) is in training sector with the French.

The 114th engineers, of the 39th division (Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana national guard troops) has just landed in France.

General March read a cablegram citing a general order issued by Major Gen. H. L. Reed, commanding the 15th Scottish division, British army, praising the first artillery brigade of the first American division (regulars) for work in cooperation with the Scots.

The order said the 15th had never received such perfect assistance in "taking over" operations, although it was realized that the American division at that time must have been under severe strain and had suffered severe casualties.

In Picardy, the chief of staff explained, the French are now within one half mile of the junction of the Chemin des Dames with the road from Mauberge and are within ten miles of Laon which is being shelled. The capture of 10,000 prisoners since Wednesday by the British are reported in press dispatches, was officially confirmed.
