NO BAN ON ATHLETICS, IS DICTUM ON HEALTH

Get Out in the Open and Play
 Baseball, Is Hassler's
 Advice.

THE Board of Health has placed
 its official sanction on outdoor
 sports, and baseball in par-
 ticular.

Dr. William C. Hassler, City Health
 Officer, said yesterday:

"One of the best preventives for
 the Spanish influenza is plenty of
 fresh air and sunshine. Get out in
 the open and play baseball."

Baseball players were wondering
 if the national pastime was to be put
 under the ban as a result of the
 health board order prohibiting pub-
 lic assemblages.

When queried yesterday by the of-
 ficials of the Shipbuilders' Baseball
 League, Dr. Hassler said that the
 kibosh had not been placed on ball
 crowds or other gatherings where the
 events were held in the open air.

This is good news to ardent base-

 mers, soccerites, golfers and others
 who find their amusement in the
 great outdoors.

 were "within the law" the San Fran-
