Berkeley Schools May Reopen Sixty-Seven New Cases at Alameda

BERKELEY, Nov. 2.—Continued improvement is shown in Berkeley's influenza situation, school of the college city may be reopened next week according to a statement of school and health officials today.

While no definite plans have been made for the reopening of the schools, the latter part of next week may see a resumption of studies if the decrease in the number of new cases continues on the part of the school officials, however, it will be necessary to wait until the opinion of Dr. J. J. Bentley, city health officer, is obtained.

That Berkeley's cases are continuing on the wane is shown by the fact that but 25 new patients were reported yesterday to be suffering with the malady. While this is less more than the preceding day, it is but half the number of cases during the early part of the week. Six of the new cases were that of children, being one child and one adult, being added to the total of 185 cases to date.

While today a report of a total of 185 cases has been reported in Berkeley since the beginning of the epidemic, with 61 deaths. New deaths in Berkeley today were:

- John Edward Parsons, 4 years old, 1039 Grove street.
- Miss Mabel E. Parsons, 1238 Grove street.
- John Hamilton, nurse, 400 1/2 Franklin street.
- Max Hamilton, 20 years old, 400 1/2 Franklin street.

HUNDREDS IN TOILS FOR NOT HAVING MASK

It cost thirty-seven Oakland citizens \$10 each this morning in police court for violating the new flu mask ordinance. The sentences imposed were uniform throughout, \$10 fine or five days in the city jail. Most of the fines were promptly paid.

Both Judge Mortimer-Smith and Judge George Samsulvud warned each of the offenders that if they were arrested again they would be given a jail sentence in addition to the fine.

It is a shame that good citizens should be brought into police court for violating the new mask ordinance. While the doctors and nurses should cooperate, we are trying to help the authorities and we feel that it may cause all citizens to wear their masks and thus aid in checking the spread of one of the worst epidemics that has raged in Oakland.

Police officers estimate that at the present rate of arrest there will be \$100,000 by Sunday morning. This time, however, will face the prospect of remaining in the city jail until Wednesday unless halted, as the police courts will not be in session either Monday or Tuesday.
