Seven Leave Today to Assist
in Combating Influenza
Epidemic.

RED CROSS GETS APPEAL

Graduates of Homoeopathic Hospital
Expected to Go Tomorrow or
Tuesday.

In response to an appeal from Boston
for nurses to assist in combating the
epidemic of Spanish influenza which
has broken out in that city, seven
nurses, graduates of the Albany hospital
training school, will leave for Boston
at 12:30 o'clock today. Despite the
warning of some uneasiness was given
last night that four would leave Albany
for Boston early this week.

The work is in charge of the Ameri-
can Red Cross. Within a few hours
after a telegram was received by Miss
Anne L. Alliss, director of the Red

Cross, several women in Albany
announced that they would volunteer
to go to Boston. The Red Cross, however,
stated that it had no place for them
in the ranks of the nursing corps of the
Albany division of the Red Cross.

Boston wants graduate nurses,
not necessarily Red Cross nurses.
None have been sent from New
York. Some or many as possible
from Albany.

Those who will go tomorrow are
Miss Constance York, Miss Anne Flan-
erty, Miss Veronica Carroll, of the
Albany hospital staff, and Miss Edna
L. Alliss, Miss Mae Dunn, Miss Mary
Neuman and Miss Julia Moreland.


Authorities at the Homoeopathic and
St. Peter's hospitals were notified of
the need for nurses in Boston and asked
to cooperate with the Red Cross in
meeting the emergency. Graduates of
the Homoeopathic hospital will probably
leave tomorrow or Tuesday, although
only a few can be sent. At St. Peter's
hospital it was said there were not
enough nurses to supply the hospital
requirement and it would be impossible
to send aid to Boston.
