REFUSES TO SURRENDER ANY SHIPS

Boundary Debates Block Peace; Dominions Refuse to Admit Japs. BRITAIN MOVES TO OWN MINES

LONDON, March 20.—Andrew Bonar Law, the government spokesman, in the House of Commons, this evening said the government had accepted the report of the special coal commission, of which Justice Sir John Sankey is chairman, including an undertaking to report on the question of nationalization by May 20.

Swiss to Grant Karl Asylum

By Associated Press. GENÈVA, March 20.—The Swiss government has received a formal demand from Emperor Karl of Austria requesting permission for him to live in Switzerland. As the allies, through Arthur J. Balfour, British foreign secretary, when sounded on the subject recently, made no objection to such residence, the request probably will be granted. The matter is now in the hands of the political department.

Jap Doctor Who Killed Rival for Nurse Gets Life

TOWSON, Md., March 20.—Dr. Norbu Ishida, Japanese alienist, today was found guilty of first degree murder for the killing of Dr. George B. Wolff, an associate, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. Conviction was made by Justice Burke and two associate judges, jury trial having been waived. The state charged Dr. Ishida, who was studying nervous diseases at Sheppard Enoch Pratt Hospital, killed Dr. Wolff because of jealousy over Miss Billie S. Jacobs, a nurse.

Brent Dow Allinson Wants Case Reviewed

Brent Dow Allinson, author of pacifist letters to Secretary Baker and a prisoner in Fort Leavenworth for resisting the draft, wants his release. Asserting he was illegally convicted, he has presented yesterday by his father, W. T. Allinson, now connected with the Red Cross. "I feel my son was not given a fair trial," said the father. "I don't mean to say I agree with his pacifist ideas but I agree with his desire to be free."
