## SCUFFLE OVER GUN FATAL

### 13-Year-Old Is Killed During Quarrel Between Boys.

**MARSHALLTOWN**—Scuffling over the possession of a 22-caliber rifle, held by 13-year-old Charles Sexton, son of a farmer living near Ferguson, Ia., resulted in the death of Merrill Spease, 13 years old, son of J. W. Spease of Ferguson.

Young Spease and several companions had gone on the Sexton land to hunt, and ran across Sexton, who ordered them off the place. The lad had his rifle with him and, it is said, threatened to shoot Spease. The latter tried to take the gun away from Sexton.

In the scuffle the rifle was discharged, and the ball penetrated Spease's groin. He died three hours later. Coroner Lynn announced last night that he would investigate the shooting today, although the case was not reported to him officially.

## OWNER HERD OF ELK

**Adair Farmer Keeps Animals As a Sort of Fad.**

# Influenza Situation Again Becomes Serious

### Strict Quarantine Measures Once More Adopted by Many Towns.

Continued and in many cases increasing seriousness of the Spanish influenza epidemic has led to re-quarantine in a great many towns and cities of the state, among them Des Moines. Reports indicate that the disease is almost as bad over the state as a month ago when strict preventive measures were observed everywhere.

The Des Moines public has been in a condition of suspense during the last week as to what form of quarantine it would have to undergo. Decisions have been made and changed almost before the ink was dry on the papers in which they were printed.

For one evening the wearing of flu masks was made compulsory in gathering places, and for a few hours the movies and dance halls looked like masquerade parties. The next day, however, the order was rescinded and an order substituted limiting movies to half their seating capacity and closing skating rinks, dance halls, Sunday schools and public schools.

## GRINNELL MEN DIE OF FLU

### Six Is Death Toll From Members of S. A. T. C.

**GRINNELL**—Six Grinnell college S. A. T. C. men, Marcus Blatt, What Cheer; Floyd Evans, Grinnell; Robert Lorens, Bloomfield; Clark Lupton, Toledo; Ora W. Perkins, Corydon, and Donald McFarland, Winthrop, have died of pneumonia developing from influenza in the last few days, and five more are in the hospital with the same disease, but not in a critical condition. To date 120 cases of the flu have been reported in the S. A. T. C.

## Buys Flu Hospital.

**CHEROKEE**—The Red Cross here is now directing its attention to home service work in caring for influenza patients, and to that end has purchased a residence, which will be converted into a hospital, where all patients may be taken and receive competent attention. The price paid for the building was \$5,500.

most critical that it has been at any time since the influenza has been on and it is estimated that there are five hundred cases within the city and adjacent territory.

**SIOUX CITY**: Sioux City is under a modified quarantine of closing schools, theaters and churches, homes and other places where persons afflicted with the disease are being cared for will be quarantined, the same as in an epidemic of small-pox. Houses will be placarded.

**ATLANTIC**: Atlantic's board of health has refused to place a ban against public gatherings because of influenza conditions, holding there was no necessity for such action.

**BOONE**: Beginning Saturday, Boone again went under quarantine for the influenza, and all theaters, churches, pool halls, schools and public gatherings of every kind will have been closed according to an order issued by the city health board.

**IOWA CITY**: A serious turn was taken in the influenza situation here, which for the past month has been regarded as practically over, when forty new cases were reported and six deaths occurred within the city in thirty hours. Thanksgiving day showed thirty new cases and the day before twenty-three.

It is understood Anastacias was answering roll call when a gas shell burst nearby and he tried to finish pronouncing his name before putting on his gas mask. He was badly gassed.

## PLAN \$1,000,000 COLLEGE

### Baptists to Decide About the School This Week.

**DES MOINES**—The Iowa Baptist state convention, which will be held in Des Moines Dec. 4-8, will determine the name, location and character of the new Baptist college planned for the city.

Convention sessions will be held in the Highland Park Presbyterian church and in the chapel of Des Moines college at Second street and Euclid avenue.

Plans are under way for the endowment of a \$1,000,000 institution. Whether the college shall remain in its present location at Des Moines college or occupy a site owned by the Baptists in Chautauqua park will be decided.
