

NEW CASES DROP TO 365 DECREASE IN DEATHS TO 63

Influenza Epidemic Apparently Succumbing to Preventive Measures.

REOPENING OF CITY FORECAST

Today's Figures May Be Basis for Definite Announcement.

New cases and deaths in the influenza epidemic dropped sharply yesterday. In the twenty-four-hour period ending at 11 o'clock last night there were reported to the health department 365 new cases of influenza. In the same time the deaths were sixty-three, a decrease from 75 reported yesterday.

These influenza complications with 63 new cases on Monday, and sixty-eight were taken as warning of the hopes of the officials that the epidemic was being checked.

Today is expected to show whether the influenza quarantine can be lifted from Buffalo in the immediate future. The intensive campaign by school teachers to check up new cases will close this afternoon. If it shows a reduction of cases and if the epidemic appears to be diminishing, an announcement of reopening the town will be forthcoming. If the epidemic and the cases show a break for the worse in the course of the epidemic, the epidemic conditions, not any human date, will occur.
