Every Dallas nurse, single or married, who has received a questionnaire from the American Red Cross, is asked to fill it out at once and send it to the secre- tary of the Dallas County Red Cross nursing committee—Miss Antoinette Al- schier, 4611 Cole avenue, Dallas. A re- quest to this effect was received Friday by Miss Alschier from Miss Lyda Ander- son, director of the nursing service of the Southwestern division of the Red Cross. She said the filling out and re- turn of the questionnaires is imperative, as the National Red Cross officials at Washington are making a Nation-wide survey of the nurses in this country in order to know how many will be avail- able for war service and for work at home among civilians. Miss Alschier said a number of Dallas County nurses have not yet sent in their questionnaires. All of them are asked to have the papers in her hands within the next few days, so that she can make up her report and send it to divisional offi- cials by Sept. 30.
