

CLOSING CLOSES WITH LITTLE NOISE

Not Much Interest Shown Except in Closing Days of the Contest.

One of the most unusual political campaigns known at least to the present generation will terminate with the general election of Tuesday next. Until within ten days of the end, political interest seemed at the lowest possible ebb. Voters joked each other on the street corners over inability to name candidates for some of the most important offices. Politics had adjourned.

It was a smouldering fire, however. The sparks had not all been extinguished.

With the publication of President Wilson's appeal for the return of the soldiers' congress the republicans took what they deemed a challenge to battle and the atmosphere has been sultry ever since.

It is the mid-year election of the presidential term and the nation at large is interested in seeing what changes in the two branches of congress will be brought about.

Contests in Iowa.
In Iowa attention is chiefly centered upon the state and congressional ticket.

United States Senator William S. Kenyon was returned to Washington for another six years without opposition.

In the second, fourth, sixth and seventh districts the election of congressmen is generally considered as doubtful. In the second district Representative Harry Hull is being opposed by Maj. N. D. Ely. In the sixth Representative Ramseyer is opposed by Corporal Buell McCash and in the eleventh Judge W. B. Boies, republican, is making a hot fight for the seat now held by G. W. Scott.

In the fourth district Congressman Eugene is opposed by C. J. Campbell, and the democrats have made an energetic fight on Haugen's record in congress.

Not Governorship Fight.
The fight on the head of the state ticket is warm. Governor Harding and his democratic opponent, Claude R. Porter, have waged no speaking campaign, but their supporters have been quietly active with the result that the members of both candidates are speaking of the outcome of the election in most confident terms.

As not one man or woman in twenty-five can name the candidates for any office under governor on the state ticket, The Register presents the list, which is as follows:

In Polk county, Cassius C. Dowell, republican candidate for congress, has opposition in the person of H. C. Evans, democrat, and Charles Gay, socialist.

In Polk county, the republican ticket is unopposed except for the office of sheriff. Sheriff John Griffin has a rival in the person of E. W. Kirkpatrick.

The Polk county republicans who will go through the formality of an election Tuesday, but are unopposed, are:

Judiciary Candidates.
The judiciary candidates in both state and county appear on a non-partisan ticket.

Frank R. Gaynor of Plymouth county and Byron W. Preston of Mahaska county, are candidates for re-election to the Supreme bench and have one opponent, V. J. McGuire of Decatur county. Truman B. Stevens, of Fremont county, appointed by Governor Harding is now a candidate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Judge Horace E. Deemer.

Considerable interest is manifested in the judicial election in Polk county. All of the present judges—Hubert Utterback, George Wilson, Lawrence De Graff, Thomas J. Guthrie and Joseph E. Meyer—are candidates for election. E. Merahan, A. A. McGarry, Henry E. Griffin, S. B. Allen and John T. Mulvaney are also on the democratic side on the Polk county judicial ticket.

AUSTRIAN FLAGSHIP SUNK

Superdreadnought Torpedoed by Daring Italians.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 1.—The Austrian superdreadnought, *Veritas*, the flagship of the Austro-Hungarian fleet at the naval base at Pola, was torpedoed and sunk Friday morning by an Italian naval task force, manned by two
