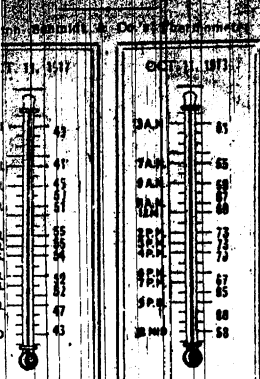

Afflicted Should Go to Bed, Says Dr. Joseph Roby.

DRIVE AGAINST SPITTING

Efforts Are Being Made to Prevent This in Street Cars and Streets. Forty-three Deaths Attributed to Influenza and Its Developments During the Present Month.

Reports of three hundred new cases of Spanish influenza were received yesterday at the office of the Health Bureau. Dr. Joseph Roby, acting health officer, said last night that there are now more than three thousand cases in Rochester.

"Influenza is increasing and probably will continue to increase for some time," said Dr. Roby last night. "The serious cases are mostly those who did not go to bed when they first became ill."

Reports from the hospitals show that most of those suffering from influenza are being treated at their homes. Eight cases were received yesterday at the General Hospital and seven at St. Mary's Hospital.

Orson Finch, of No 120 Mason street, died of influenza at the Hahnemann Hospital, and Richard McElligott died of the same disease at St. Mary's Hospital. Two deaths occurred at the General Hospital. Yesterday morning a hurry call was sent for the ambulance from Erie street, where Frank Lemonica had been taken with the disease.

CALL FOR PHYSICIANS IS ISSUED BY GOVERNMENT

Dr. William B. Jones, of No. 525 Lake avenue last evening received the following telegram from Surgeon-General Rupert Blue, of the United States Public Health Service:

"Please wire names and addresses of all physicians who can be appointed as acting army surgeons for temporary duty. Compensation \$200 per month, transportation expenses with \$4 per day for subsistence during the duration of service."

The call evidently is sent out on account of existing conditions in army camps through the severity of the Spanish influenza, and Dr. Jones requests that all physicians who are available notify him at once by telephone.

NOT TO OBSERVE COLUMBUS DAY

Celebration Planned for Tonight Is Canceled.

D. A. R. HOUSE TO BE CLOSED

No Entertainments for Soldiers to Be Held There Because of Epidemic. Gates Church Postpones Observance of Its 90th Anniversary.

The celebration of Columbus Day, which had been planned by Rochester Council of the Knights of Columbus for to-day, has been indefinitely postponed.

On account of the prevalence of Spanish influenza the D. A. R. Chapter House, at No. 100 Spring street, will be closed as far as entertaining soldiers is concerned, to-day and to-morrow.

The celebration of the ninetieth anniversary of Gates Presbyterian Church was to have taken place on Sunday, October 20th, but has been postponed.

The health classes being conducted in Rochester public schools with the co-operation of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce have been discontinued because of influenza.

The meeting of the Union Ministerial Association of Rochester and vicinity, which was to have been held on Monday, has been postponed.

The retreat which was to have been given by an Oblate father from Buffalo, in the Catholic Church of the Holy Rosary, has been postponed and the solemn celebration of the feast of the Holy Rosary.

Other events postponed because of the epidemic follow: The first meeting of the citizenship course of the Council of Jewish Women, scheduled for Sunday evening with an address by Assemblyman Simon Adler.

NO PROTESTANT CHURCH TO HOLD SUNDAY SERVICE

Will Remain Closed to Help Check Influenza.

FAVORS HOME DEVOTIONS

Statement Issued for Ministerial Union Suggests Them - Plans of First Baptists and North Street Methodists Are Especially Upset

A committee of ministers representing the Protestant churches of Rochester called on Mayor Edgerton yesterday afternoon and offered their cooperation in preventing the spread of influenza here.

The following statement was made by Mr. Cherry on behalf of the committee: "As a measure of prevention, it is felt that there might be no possibility that the situation regarding influenza should become as bad here as in other cities, we wished to inform the Mayor that the Protestant churches of the city would be closed on Sunday."

No Protestant Services.

So far as known all services and Sunday-school meetings of Protestant churches will be omitted.

At the request of members of the Ministerial Union of Rochester and vicinity, the president, Rev. Henry H. Barstow, has prepared the following suggestions for use of the day, no part of which will be occupied with public services:

"Sunday with the churches closed will be a fine opportunity for Christian people to keep the home fires burning for religious culture. Personal and family devotions and Bible study, taken with the Sunday-school lesson, a sermon from the church paper and helpful visitations to the sick and lonely, should surely have right of way over idle amusement and mere social visiting."

Centennial Exercises Postponed. The First Baptist Church had planned to hold services celebrating its centennial, but these have been postponed.

At a meeting of the Rochester Lutheran Pastoral Conference held yesterday forenoon at the parish house of the Church of the Reformation, before the decision to omit services became so general as it did later, the following churches agreed to omit all their services and Sunday-school sessions: Church of the Reformation, Zion, St. John's, Concordia, Trinity, Grace, St. Paul's, Christ Church, Church of the Redeemer, St. Matthew's, St. Andrew's, St. Peter's.

The annual union Reformation service, which was announced for Sunday, October 27th, at Convention Hall, also will be omitted. Rev. Charles M. Jacobs, D. D., of the Theological Seminary at Mount Airy, Pa., well known in the Lutheran denomination throughout the United States, had been engaged to speak.
