Atlanta Red Cross to Furnish "Flu" Patients With Doctors and Nurses

Believed in This Way That Situation Will Be Prevented From Getting as Bad as in October

The Atlanta Red Cross will furnish doctors and nurses for all influenza patients who cannot get medical attention themselves. "We believe in this way we can stop the influenza situation from getting anything like as bad as it was in October," said Lee Ashcraft, chairman of the Atlanta chapter of the Red Cross, in explaining Tuesday morning the plans of the association.

"It is not to impress on the people the fact that influenza isn't nearly as prevalent or deadly as it was here. But it has become a return, and we mean to stop it by making a survey of the city by wards to determine where the worst cases are. We will then furnish them such assistance."

"When the whole country was swept by influenza, Atlanta got off lighter than other cities because the Red Cross took preventive measures here. We are going to do the same thing again, and we hope for equal success."

"Our office will center about furnishing nurses and doctors for those who can't get medical attention. We will give our best to any one in this condition, whether he be rich or poor."

"For the purpose of finding out just how widespread influenza is, we are going to make our survey by wards, and then furnish medical aid whenever it is needed. Owing to the scarcity of nurses we are going to try community nursing. A trained nurse will be assigned to a group of patients and she will supervise the nursing of those patients by the nurses' aid."

To Survey the City
Mr. Ashcraft appointed the following ward chairmen to lead in a survey of the city for the purpose of finding out just how many cases of influenza there are in Atlanta and in how many instances medical attention is lacking.
