Start a Glass Mounts

George Dryer, secretary of the home industries bureau, proposes that auto owners accept glass whenever offered to them, to be delivered to the department glass headquarters, on the vacant lot at Stevens and Second.

"If your neighbor has a car and you have not, ask him to deliver your glass for you," said Mr. Dryer. "Americans are no slackers, and this will be one of the little ways of helping the Red Cross. The glass should be in containers."

"Another plan is to have the drivers of all downtown stores accept glass for delivery to the salvage department," said Mrs. Charles Heberd, head of the department. "All captains of the salvage districts, under Mrs. J. K. Smith, have organized for the campaign. Dr. Howard Clemmer will assist in directing the campaign, and Racey Kilmer will make arrangements for trucks to load the car."

GAS STATIONS OPEN SUNDAYS, IS NEW ORDER

Spokane gasoline stations will be open for service on Sundays, beginning tomorrow, according to the managers of local companies. The closing order was issued by the Washington State Council of Defense and has been in effect for over a month. The order issued by the national fuel administration closing such places after 6 o'clock in the evening has not been changed.

"Instructions from our home office in San Francisco are to the effect that we open tomorrow," said C. M. Harris, manager of the local branch of the Standard Oil company, today. Kilmer & Sons and Shell service stations will also open tomorrow.

MUST GET MASKS BY NEXT MONDAY

Police Will Arrest Those Without Gauze Screens After Warning Today.

Warnings today; arrests Monday. That is the course to be followed by police officials in enforcing the "flu" mask order of the state board of health. Announcement of this was made today by the department of public safety after two communications were received from Dr. J. B. Anderson calling attention to the fact that the order is not being observed and requesting Commissioner Tilsley to begin a strict enforcement of the mask edict.

Chief of Police Weir ordered all of his patrolmen and detectives to wear masks and to begin warning people in stores, elevators, streetcars and other public places that they must be protected by masks or suffer the consequences. Commissioner Tilsley today stated that he will order arrests to be made Monday.

Mayor Dons Mask.

Everybody from Mayor Fassett to the elevator operators wore masks at the city hall today. So far the officials have not encountered any defiance of the order and none is anticipated. Official placards enumerating the provisions of the state order were posted conspicuously all over the city today by the health office.

The following communications were received by Commissioner Tilsley from Dr. Anderson today:

"The 'flu' mask order has been announced in this town now three days. The least that we can expect is that city officials who are entrusted with the execution of the law are amenable to that law and measure their conduct in accordance therewith.

"I beg to call your attention to the fact that some of the members of the

police department are not observing the regulation. Will you be good enough to indicate to them that if we find any member of the police department or detective force in violation of the order of the state board of health governing and controlling the wearing of masks, a warrant will be asked for. I feel sure that this policy will meet with your approval.

"JOHN B. ANDERSON, Health Officer."

Means Citizens, Too.

In another short letter to Commissioner Tilsley, also written this morning, Dr. Anderson says:

"Inadvertently, in my communication to you this morning, I omitted 'violators among the civil population.' In other words, I will thank you to instruct your officers from now on to arrest people in violation of the state regulations as set out by the instructions.

DR. J. B. ANDERSON, Health Officer.

"Any operator of an elevator where the public ride is absolutely forbidden to carry passengers without a mask on," stated Dr. Anderson this morning.

HEARS BROTHER IS KILLED IN ACTION
