OPENINGS AT NAVY YARD

Many Men Needed There to carry Out Big Program

There are required at the local Navy Yard, in order to carry out successfully the government's enlarged program for war work, mechanics, machinists, shipbuilders, shipfitters, toolmakers, fitters, steamfitters, grinders, operators, millers, machine operators, boring mill operators, shaper operators, lathe operators, all around machinists, machinists for laying out machine work, outside machinists, marine experiences, sewing machine operators (experienced).

Persons living some distance from this yard who are qualified in any of the foregoing trades and occupations can obtain appointments with transportation to Charleston by applying through the Civil Service Commission, D. C. Application form No. 1800 should be used, and these may be obtained from any navy yard labor board in the postmaster's office.

There is also a demand for additional craftsmen (operating) for lathe, ornamental, or three tons) dresser, boy (sixteen years or over), boilermakers, millwrights, steamfitters, toolmakers, fitters, shipbuilders, helpers, millwrights, boilermakers, helpers, millwrights, general helpers and inspectors, sewing machine operators, in which positions the applicant should apply on receiving the district or form board, non-residents applying by mail (national applicants applying in person at the local board) for employment at the Navy Yard. Those applying in person may have their medical certificates and jurats or skills executed without cost.

NOTED ORATOR TO LAUNCH CAMPAIGN

Fred B. Smith Will Address Mass Meeting at Garden

JUST COME FROM FRANCE

E. H. King Assists Local Committee in Getting Nationally Sought Speaker

Fred B. Smith, who is recognized as one of the greatest orators of the day, and who is to open the united war work campaign in this city with an address at a mass meeting to be held at the Garden Theater Sunday evening at 8.15 o'clock is recognized as one of the few men who know all about the American soldier, in his address Sunday night Mr. Smith will tell what the men "over there" think of united war work and he knows what he is talking about, for he has just returned from a long stay among the Allied troops at the front.

In securing Mr. Smith for this city, members of the local executive committee have, with the assistance of E. H. King, of Charleston, who is in charge of united war work in the Southern Department, accomplished a feat that a great many larger cities failed to put over. Mr. Smith is hailed as one of the most eloquent Americans and the most being the brings, bearing as it does upon every loyal citizen, is expected to secure for him one of the largest audiences ever assembled in this city.

Mr. Smith's address will launch a drive for united war work among Uncle Sam's soldiers and marines overseas. Hundreds of thousands of men will crowd the handsome theater, the use of which Mr. A. S. Biddle, president of the Pastime Amusement Company, has generously and patriotically contributed to the united war work mass meeting.

Every man, and woman in Charleston, who can find a seat or standing room in the theater is invited to attend. The first floor and balcony will be given over to white persons while the gallery, usually reserved for colored people, will be reserved for them. A fitting introductory is being planned for the principal speaker of the evening and the entire program promises to be one not only of special appeal at this time, but one that will prove of exceeding interest to Charlestonians and other South Carolinians who have always been appreciative of oratory and sincerity.
