Rhode Island Reports 13 Deaths of Spanish Influenza During Day

Nine of These Occur in Providence.—Situation at Present Does Not Appear Serious

Conditions Among Naval Men at Newport Show Steady Improvement.—State Board of Health Would Close Amusement Places, but Opposition Develops.—City Authorities See No Need of Shutting Up Public Schools

Yesterday found little change in the Spanish influenza situation in Rhode Island and vicinity. Deaths among civilians in the State totalled 13 yesterday as against 12 on the previous day and as far as could be ascertained the number of new cases in the State was not large.

Of the 13 deaths in Rhode Island, eight occurred at the Rhode Island Hospital, one other in this city, two at Newport, one at Pawtucket and one at Greenwood. There was also one death in Attleboro and two at Fall River, making a total of 16 for the district. At Newport the situation is showing steady improvement and in Bristol, which was hard hit, yesterday found but few new cases and no deaths.

The State Board of Health in session yesterday voted to ask Governor Beekman to issue a proclamation to-day ordering all amusement places, including theatres, moving picture houses and dance halls, closed. The board also voted to leave to the various city health authorities the advisability of the closing of schools, churches, etc. Governor Beekman is in Washington at the present time, having gone there to lay before the Federal authorities conditions at Newport.

SCHOOLS TO REMAIN OPEN

The action of the State board is opposed by Mayor Gainer and Superintendent of Health Chapin of this city, while Superintendent of Schools Winslow of this city and health authorities in other cities of the State, except at Newport, are not in favor of the closing of the public schools at present.

The situation at the hospitals in Providence remains about the same. The Rhode Island Hospital had seven new cases yesterday, making a total of 43 patients afflicted with the disease at that institution. There are also many civilian cases under treatment. Eight deaths occurred at that institution yesterday. Several patients are considered in a dangerous condition. At St. Joseph's Hospital no new cases were admitted yesterday, and all there are now improving. At the City Hospital eight new cases were admitted yesterday, making a total of about 70 cases there, only one being of a serious nature. No deaths resulting from the disease occurred at either of the last named two institutions yesterday.

In Pawtucket and Central Falls and towns in that vicinity the disease has not assumed a serious character and, in fact, the centre of the epidemic in Rhode Island at present would seem to include Newport, Bristol and Providence, the sit-

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BULGARIAN PROPOSAL BACKED BY PARLIAMENTARY LEADERS

Made in Accordance with Wishes of Ministerial Bloc.

Copenhagen, Sept. 27.—Bulgaria's proposal to the Allies for an armistice was made in accordance with the wishes of the leaders of the ministerial bloc of the Bulgarian Parliament, according to advices from Sofia. The Parliament will meet on Sept. 30.

Rhode Island Ready for Fourth Liberty Loan

Rhode Island's organization is on tip-toe for the opening this morning of the three weeks drive for the Fighting Fourth Liberty Loan, \$50,000,000 of the \$6,000,000,000 total, which is this State's quota.

The message of the loan will be brought to the people by shop and mass meetings, theatre addresses, moving pictures, posters and scores of other devices, all intended to prepare the way for the army of thousands of salesmen who will take subscriptions.

Four big mass meetings have thus far been scheduled as follows: Strand Theatre, to-morrow evening at 7:45; Elks' auditorium next Monday afternoon at 3; Billy Sunday's Liberty Loan meeting at the Tabernacle, Monday evening, Oct. 14, and Col. Roosevelt's meeting at the Tabernacle Thursday evening, Oct. 17.

Exchange place in this city will be turned into a bower of beauty for the campaign. A bronze statue of George Washington is to be set up in front of City Hall, while plaster casts of nearly a dozen more individuals and groups, all loaned, by the Gorham Manufacturing Company, will be placed about the mall.

The electric light and trolley wire poles in the square will be decked with flags of the allied nations and ropes of laurel will be festooned from pole to pole. As the centre of the attraction there will be a huge Liberty Loan chest under a gay canopy upon a platform in front of the waiting station. Into this chest each day will be dumped the piles of "gold" representing the Liberty Loan subscriptions recorded in the State during the preceding 24 hours. This chest will take the place of the loan thermometer that was used in the last drive.
