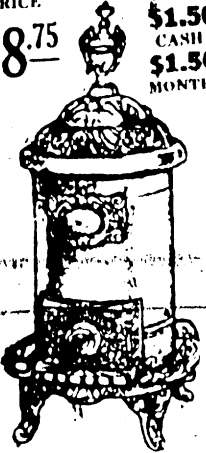

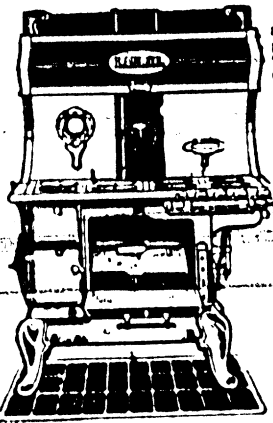

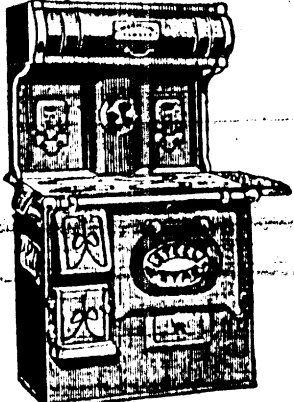

It is said that "Boss" Brower is delaying the selection of a state central committee man to succeed Judge Matthews because of his purpose to place himself in that position and fill that office in connection with his duties as a member of the state executive committee. It is known that because of Brower's insistence that he be given the executive committee membership was the estrangement that finally caused the estrangement between him and Judge Matthews, and terminated in Matthews withdrawing from the state central committee. There seems to be no question, however, but that the place made vacant by the resignation of Judge Matthews will be filled by Dr. L. C. Weimer or the "Boss" himself.

It now appears that the movement, designed to repeal the law requiring cities over 100,000 to register each year, will be taken up again when the next general election comes. It is claimed that those most closely in touch with the situation, believe that the interest of the government can be subserved equally as well with fewer registrations. In fact, there seems to exist some sentiment, looking to the repeal of the present law and the enactment of a measure providing for one general registration and for registration for only new voters. And those persons who may have moved during the interim existing between elections from one precinct to another, in behalf of this plan, it is argued, that the expense involved in the enforcement of such a law as is proposed, would be much less than that incurred under the operation of the present system. At any rate, the campaign is already in its infancy, and it seems a foregone conclusion that it will assume formidable proportions by the time the next session of the Ohio legislative body is called.

But regardless as to what may be the outcome of the campaign to change the registration law, attention is being called by election officials and others to the importance of a full registration for the coming election. Never before was an election more vitally significant to this nation than that now approaching. Dayton made an excellent showing last Thursday. The records show that the number of persons qualifying last Thursday established a record for the second registration day in Dayton. Never before has it occurred, it is said, that the results of the second day's registration have exceeded those of the first day. A deliberate drive has been launched, therefore, to make the next two days commensurate in their results with those of last Thursday. As has been pointed out, there is a tremendous vote in Dayton—perhaps larger than ever before—that has never been registered here. Votes this year in behalf of the government are vitally important. The officials at Washington have been doing their duty as they see it. They deserve to be buoyed up in their efforts to bring this war to a speedy close, or, if they have failed in the performance of their duty in the minds of the public, which, after all, is the court of final appeal, they are entitled to know it. The men in the trenches will not be here to vote. In consequence, public sentiment at home must be reflected by those who are here. As a result, a real responsibility is created and this should be fully and courageously assumed.

The Willis Aibi league has been organized in Columbus to combat the effect of the Patriotic League of Ohio, made up of Republicans who have come in the service, and who have protested against the candidacy of former Governor Frank B. Willis because of his pro-war record. The organization has adopted the name of the Willis Patriotic League, and is organized by David F. Fugh, chairman; J. H. Thomas, secretary, and Murray Hoffman, treasurer. These gentlemen hold the same office in the Willis Volunteer Republican League.

soliciting membership to support Mr. Willis because of "his untiring zeal, his faithful, consistent and invaluable labor in behalf of the Liberty Loan, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., and every other endeavor to win the war," as those "having confidence in his honesty, integrity and ability as a public official, and the type of citizen that should be called to public office." This change of name and work of organization at a time when the Liberty Loan campaign needs stimulus, is considered as a violation of the "no politics" truce, and aroused the comment that the Republican state organization which has been making herculean efforts to back Mr. Willis at patriotic gatherings has been attempting to inject politics into patriotic work itself. The Willis Aibi league makes no attempt to withdraw the statements making up the cut-throat record of their candidate, but rather to emphasize his present activity since it has been shown that the people have a disposition to consider the winning of the war the all important issue. A Liberty Loan manager likened the present activity to that of a man who had been convicted of a crime, and then turned state's evidence to save his skin, immediately thereafter seeking to be chosen state attorney or judge of the court. Harry W. Smith, president of the Patriotic League of Ohio, said he had no comment to offer, for the reason that the Patriotic League had no other activity at this time than to promote the sale of Liberty Bonds. "After we have gone over the top, and the Liberty Loan campaign is ended will be sufficient time to discuss political matters," said Mr. Smith. At this time it is expected he will pay his respects to Mr. Willis and his pro-war record, as did Prof. Johnson, of Granville University.

DEATH TOLL AT FIELD NOW 32

Three More Soldiers Succumb to Influenza at Wilbur Wright Post. Epidemic Abating.

Three more deaths in the hospital at Wilbur Wright aviation field Saturday brought the death toll from the influenza epidemic at that post up to 32, all soldiers. Those whose deaths occurred Saturday were Private Ray Goldstein, New York city; Private James A. Houg, Petersburg, Va. and Private Vernon Meloney, West Cheshire, Conn. Major A. G. Farmer, chief medical officer at the field continued to be highly encouraged Saturday evening over the prospects of the epidemic running its course. While there are still some patients at the hospital whose recovery is not expected, the daily falling off in the sick call at the post gives rise to these expectations. The father of Private Golstein had been at the side of his son for 24 hours before death came.
