DANISH AUTHORITIES CONFISCATE PLANE.

Danish papers of a recent date contained the following account of the escape of two Germans from Berlin:

"A startling airplane exploit created a tremendous stir in Copenhagen. About 4 o'clock in the morning a giant airplane landed near the Danish capital. Two men, both wearing straw hats, emerged from the machine. They were at once taken into custody by Danish officers.

"The machine was confiscated by the Danish authorities. It was one of the great Albatross planes used at the flying school at Neuruppin, Germany.

"The two Germans declared at first that they would in no circumstances reveal their names. One of them asserted he was a litterateur and that he knew nothing whatever of flying. His comrade, however, was an extraordinarily well trained aviator.

"The second machine, which contained their two comrades, was shot down.

"Later it was learned that one of the two passengers who arrived in Denmark is a physician and the other a professor at the University of Berlin.
