## ARREST ALL MASKLESS AS CASES GROW

The city council enacted the flu mask ordinance today and Commissioner of Public Health and Safety Fred F. Moore at once directed Chief of Police A. H. Soderstrom to instruct all patrolmen to arrest every person found on the streets of Oakland without a mask.

The police authorities have so far refrained from making arrests in the hope that the people would see the necessity of wearing masks and conform to the health ordinance without the use of drastic action, but since there are still a large number of persons who have either deliberately or thoughtlessly failed to obey this rule the police will begin at once today to place all persons who appear maskless.

**INCREASE IN SICKNESS.**  
Reports to the Board of Health today up to 11:30 showed an increase in influenza cases, the result, officials say, of the people relaxing in a measure the wearing of masks. Up to 11:30 the total of cases reported for the past twenty-four hours had reached 227, or 37 more than in the same period yesterday.

Discharges in the past twenty-four hours totaled 308, and deaths totaled 15 in the same period. The total of cases to date is 5024, and the cases up and down number 2243, Deaths total 230.

For the past two days, say health officers, the public has become careless regarding the wearing of masks. Today's jump in new cases is said to be due directly to this.

**13 DEATHS AT HOSPITAL.**  
Admissions to the emergency influenza hospital at the auditorium for the twenty-four hours ending at midnight yesterday were 127, an increase over yesterday's admissions. Thirteen deaths were reported in the same period, and 322 discharges. There were 450 patients on hand in the hospital at noon today, a small increase over yesterday, but tonight's discharges are expected to bring this down to a normal level, according to the hospital authorities. The situation seems to be better as yesterday.

"I have instructed the chief of police to strictly enforce the law," said Commissioner Moore this morning. "I intend to see that it is enforced, that the city and county health officers will be dealt with severely and I want to say at this time that the persons taken into custody under this law will be dealt with as severely as the law permits."

"Those should be taken into custody who are perfectly well and feel that they do not need a mask, and that there are others who are in such good condition and to whom the mask ordinance is not necessary."

## Less Flu; Churches Will Resume San Jose Conditions Are Improving

SAN JOSE, Nov. 1.—Another marked falling off in influenza cases was noted during the past 24 hours, only 16 new cases being taken down with it yesterday. The mask has proven efficient. We are getting the best of the epidemic. Let all good citizens wear their masks and we will shortly stamp out this dread malady which has removed from the mortal limbs of the finest men and women the community.

**MORE NURSES NEEDED.**  
The nurses bureau of the city health department on the sixth floor of the city hall, needs 100 more volunteer nurses. Those who came forward in the first days of the epidemic and who have worked their Treasons, are rapidly tiring out. New women are needed and they must be secured at once if there is danger that the splendid staff which the emergency hospital officials have gotten on the job.

It was reported today in the health office that 72 of the 300 patients at that address the influenza in Oakland are sick with the influenza and that garbage collection in many districts was practically at a standstill. Commissioner Moore suggested that the health department should take measures to be taken to relieve the situation and he will call a conference with the city engineers and undertakers to make a new arrangement for the handling of the garbage during the present crisis.

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## Berkeley Flu Cases on Wane Crest Is Reached in Epidemic

BERKELEY, Nov. 1.—First indications that Berkeley's influenza epidemic is on the wane and that the crest has been reached in the epidemic in the college city were given by the police today when 67 cases were reported to health officials as new patients coming down with the malady yesterday.

Today's report shows a decrease of more than half the number of cases reported in yesterday. Of the 67 cases yesterday 47 were in Berkeley proper and the remainder on the campus of the University of California.

According to health officials the end of the week will probably show a marked decrease in Berkeley's influenza patients. It is declared that the worst stage of the epidemic has now, in all probability, passed.

Some thirty new patients were admitted today in their arrests yesterday, making a total of more than 70 adults and children now being cared for.

Berkeley's officers of the law continued today in their arrests of maskless citizens, a total of 212 violators of the law now being booked at the police station. One hundred and twenty-three were taken into custody yesterday and fifteen up to noon today.

**WHOLE FORCE TAKEN.**  
D. L. Jungck, Berkeley's realty dealer of Shattuck and University avenues, and his whole office force were sequestered to police station yesterday afternoon for failing to wear masks while at work.

Raiders also being made on other offices where two or more people are employed and where provisions of the ordinance are being ignored.
