DEATHS IN BOSTON

Forty-two deaths from influenza and
eight from pneumonia occurred in Bos-
ton between 10 last night and noon to-
day, it was announced by the Health
Department. This is approximately the
same number as occurred for the same
period yesterday.

NOT TO OPEN UNTIL OCT 7

In view of the seriousness of the pres-
ent epidemic the School Committee has
decided not to reopen the Boston schools
until Monday, Oct 7.

The School Committee and the superin-
tendent desire to call the attention of
teachers and members of the supervising
staff to the opportunity of giving as-
sistance, especially in clerical work, for
local and district draft boards. Appli-
cation for further information should
be made to Michael J. Downey, Mason-st
Building.

The school board says it would seem to
be inadvisable that teachers should un-
dertake to give personal care to suffer-
ers from influenza, except in their own
immediate families. Any one engaged in
such service will be subject at its end to
a quarantine of one week, and it is im-
portant that all available teachers shall
be ready to resume their duties on the
day the schools reopen.
